14.25 – 15.05 **The Biocidal Product Directive (BPD): At Your Doorstep**

The Biocidal Product Directive (98/8/EC) will effect the use and supply of all biocidal products in EU countries. This will have consequences for the user, manufacturers, distributors and the formulators of biocidal products.

A broad spectrum of biocidal products are available for sale on the European market. All these products will have to comply with the BPD. Examples of these products are disinfectants, preservatives, hand disinfectants etc.

In addition to the huge cost implications, the process and timing of the various phases of the BPD is critical for all parties involved.

One of the consequences of the introduction of the BPD is that non-supported disinfectants will be taken from the market in September 2006.

This and further implications of the introduction of the BPD will be highlighted in this session.
